Clinicians – Jazz Gordon Foote, Brad Turner, Bill Kristjanson, David Grott

Gordon Foote



Gordon Foote, professor emeritus, University of Toronto, Faculty of Music, retired after a 45-year career. He taught grades 7 through 12 in Winnipeg, and then 42 years at the university level. He was in the cohort at St.FX University in Nova Scotia, as they pioneered the first university jazz degree in Canada (1980). Following that, he spent 26 years at McGill University, developing that degree, which included the first jazz degrees at the graduate level in Canada (Master of Music and DMA). The last 9 years were spent at the University of Toronto. Through his career he was involved in university teaching and administration, holding several

positions: chair of the jazz area, department chair, director of graduate studies, associate dean of performance and interim dean. His education included the University of Minnesota and the University of North Texas. At Minnesota, he was graduate assistant for the director of bands, Frank Bencriscutto. The university big bands he directed were recognized as among the best bands in North America. There was a significant number of tours, (France, England, Ireland, Switzerland, Mexico, and throughout the USA and Canada) opening many festivals and performing with major guest artists. The bands produced 16 recordings. The IAJE invited the McGill Jazz Ensemble to open the international night concert in New York. The guest with the band for that show, was Guido Basso (sadly Guido recently passed away at 85 years old). As a saxophonist and Conn-Selmer artist, Gordon has presented countless workshops, guest appearances, adjudicated many festivals, and directed several honor jazz bands in Canada and the USA. Gordon Foote, professor emeritus, University of Toronto, Faculty of Music, recently retired after a 45-year career. He taught grades 7 through 12 in Winnipeg, and then 42 years at the university level. He was in the teaching cohort at St. Francis Xavier University, Nova Scotia in 1980, when they pioneered the first university jazz studies program in Canada. Following that, he spent 26 years at McGill University, developing that program, which included the first jazz degrees at the graduate level in Canada (Master of Music and DMA). The last 9 years were spent at the University of Toronto. Through his career he was involved in university teaching and administration, holding several positions: chair of the jazz area, department chair, director of graduate studies, associate dean of performance and interim dean.

His education included the University of Minnesota and the University of North Texas. At Minnesota, he was graduate assistant for the director of bands, Frank Bencriscutto. The university big bands he directed were recognized as among the best bands in North America. There were many tours, (France, England, Ireland, Switzerland, Mexico, and throughout the USA and Canada) opening many festivals (including 6 IAJE performances) and performing with major guest artists. The bands produced 15 recordings. The IAJE invited the McGill Jazz Orchestra, as guest ensemble, to open the international night concert in New York.

As a saxophonist and Conn-Selmer artist, Gordon has presented countless workshops, guest appearances, adjudicated many festivals, and directed several honour jazz bands in Canada and the USA.

Brad Turner



Trumpeter, pianist, drummer and composer Brad Turner is one of Canada's most highly esteemed jazz musicians. Brad has performed and/or recorded with such artists as Joe Lovano, Ingrid Jensen, Bill Frisell, Kenny Wheeler, John Scofield, Lewis Nash, Reneé Rosnes, Peggy Lee, Mike Murley, Seamus Blake, Peter Bernstein, Terri Lyne Carrington, Charles McPherson and Ernie Watts. As a leader, Brad has released fifteen albums, ten as a trumpeter with the Brad Turner Quartet/Quintet, and four as a pianist with his trio. Four of those releases have been nominated for Juno awards. Brad is a three-time Juno Award winner, the recipient of the

2006 Victor Lynch-Staunton Prize for excellence in musical achievement, and the 2014 Vancouver Mayor's Art Award for music.

Brad is a member of the jazz studies faculty at Capilano University in North Vancouver, B.C.

David Grott



David Grott has been a freelance trombonist and bass trombonist in Montreal since 1986, doing concerts, shows, musical theatre, and studio work. David has performed on hundreds of studio recordings, and can be heard on CD's by Sarah Mclachlan, Cirque du Soleil, Celine Dion, Ginette Reno, Robert Charlebois, Offenbach, Daniel Lavoie, Les Colocs, Oliver Jones, Vic Vogel, Sonny Greenwich, Christine Jensen, Lorraine Desmarais, and Joe Sullivan among many others.

David is presently the lead trombone player in the Christine Jensen Big Band, Joe Sullivan Big Band, Altsys Jazz Orchestra, L'Orchestre National de Jazz de Montreal, and Vic Vogel's Le Jazz Big Band. David is also on the faculty at both McGill & Concordia Universities teach jazz trombone performance.

David has also toured extensively in the United States and Asia with musical theatre productions such as An American In Paris, The King And I, Chicago, 42nd Street, and many others.

Bill Kristjanson



Bill Kristjanson is currently a sessional instructor at the University of Manitoba teaching music education courses including, "Introduction to Jazz for Music Educators," "Jazz Pedagogy," and "Jazz History." For many years he taught at Vincent Massey Collegiate, Glenlawn Collegiate, and Minnetonka schools, and served as Divisional Music Consultant.

Bill has been invited to present at the International Association of Jazz Educators' Conference, the Canadian Music Educators Conference, and provincial music education conferences in British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and Newfoundland. Among guest conducting roles, he has conducted the Manitoba Provincial Junior Honour Band, Intermediate Honour Band, Honour Jazz Band, the Winnipeg Wind Ensemble and at the International Music Camp. He has adjudicated at numerous jazz and concert band festivals across Western Canada and Ontario.

Bill is the recipient of numerous awards recognizing teaching excellence and service to music education including, the "Manitoba Band Association Award of Distinction", "Manitoba Jazz Educator of the Year Award", a "CMEA Builders Award" the "D.W. Penner Award for Exceptional Service in Education" and the Canadian Band Association "National Band Award."

Bill's teaching philosophy revolves around, "Finding something good, and helping it grow."

Shelley Axelson



Shelley Axelson is currently the Director of Bands at Radford University in Virginia where she conducts the Wind Ensemble, Campus-Community Band, graduate conducting students, and teaches courses in the music education curriculum. She was previously an Assistant Professor of Music Education and Assistant Director of Bands at Montclair State University in New Jersey for twelve years where her duties included conducting the Symphonic Band and teaching courses in conducting, instrumental methods, and music education. She also served as an academic advisor, faculty advisor for Sigma Alpha Iota, and created a Campus Band and Pep Band so students majoring in a

subject other than music would have an opportunity to continue their musical education and experiences.

Axelson earned her undergraduate degree in music education from the University of South Florida, where she studied conducting with Jerry Junkin, Michael Votta, and Mallory Thompson. She continued her training by earning a Master of Music degree in Conducting at the University of Michigan, where her principal teacher was H. Robert Reynolds. After graduating from Michigan, she taught at Pasco Middle School in Dade City, Florida (co-author of the Secondary Music Curriculum), and Richardson Junior High in Richardson, Texas.

After earning her Doctorate in Conducting with Mallory Thompson at Northwestern University, Axelson was appointed Director of Bands at Central College in Pella, Iowa where she was responsible for running all aspects of the band program. After three years in Iowa, she relocated to Indianapolis, Indiana to become the Assistant Professor of Music Education at the University of Indianapolis. In 2009, she joined the faculty of the John J. Cali School of Music at Montclair State University in New Jersey and has been at Radford University since the fall of 2022.

Axelson is a highly sought-after conductor, clinician, presenter, and adjudicator for professional development events, band festivals, honor bands, and conferences throughout the United States and Canada. She recently presented at the National Association for Music Education Regional Conference in Atlantic City and the Mid-West Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago.

Axelson is a proud member of the College Music Society, College Band Directors National Association, National Association for Music Education, and Sigma Alpha Iota.

Gareth Jones



Gareth Jones is the director of the University of Calgary's Wind Ensemble and the Symphonic Band as well as being the Instructor of Trumpet and Conducting. He is also the Director of Alberta Winds. In 2014 he was named the conductor of the National Youth Band of Canada. He was Assistant Principal Trumpet with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra from 1992 to 2007 and continues to play with the CPO whenever his conducting schedule allows. Before that, he held the same position with the Tulsa Philharmonic Orchestra. He has studied conducting with the renowned pedagogues Jorma Panula, Gustav Meier, Michael Haithcock, and Michael Jinbo. He has conducted ensembles from across Western Canada as well as

Mexico and the United States. Mr. Jones's musical activities are greatly varied. He has appeared as guest conductor and clinician with hundreds of wind ensembles and orchestras been featured on Juno nominated blues CDs, appeared on CBC radio as a soloist and chamber musician, been a guest lecturer with the National Youth Orchestra of Canada, been an adjudicator at music festivals across Canada, as well as conducting honour bands across Canada and was a reviewer for the latest update of the Royal Conservatory of Music trumpet syllabus. He received the University of Calgary Teaching Excellence Award in 2018. In 1996, he placed first among North American competitors in the Ellesworth-Smith International Trumpet Guild Solo Competition, placing third worldwide. He can be heard playing chamber music, jazz, blues, and rhythm and blues with various groups around Calgary. As a conductor he founded the Calgary Honour Band and the University of Calgary Brass Choir. He was also a founding member of the chamber ensemble "Rosa Selvatica" and has been a featured soloist with the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra on several occasions. He studied conducting at the Pierre Monteux Institute and Canada's National Arts Centre and received his Master of Music in conducting from the University of Calgary. He studied trumpet at Northwestern University with renowned pedagogue Vincent Cichowicz, where he won the prestigious concerto competition and a scholarship for performing excellence. Gareth Jones is a Yamaha Artist.

Kathie Van Lare



Kathie Van Lare received her B. Mus. ("With Distinction"), Teacher Certification and Dip. F.A. in Wind Band Conducting, all from the University Of Calgary. Born and raised in Calgary, she has been teaching music in the Calgary area for 35 years, and though now retired, she continues to be active as a guest conductor and adjudicator throughout much of Western Canada for both concert and jazz bands. She also currently serves as the Musical Director for the Foothills Music Society Concert Band, the Westwinds Music Society Gold Jazz South and the Calgary Women's Jazz Orchestra. Kathie has participated on various committees for the Alberta Band Association, the Alberta International Band Festival and JazzYYC. She is currently Vice President of the Band Masters Fraternity, Phi Beta Mu and is the Past - (Co) President of Women Band Director's International -Alberta Chapter. She has presented at the Manitoba Music Educators Conference, Calgary Teacher's Convention,

JazzYYC's Tune In, Tune Up, Conference as well as the "Women Led" Jazz Symposium in Winnipeg. She has also taught at the Calgary Regional Summer Band Workshop and the International Music Camp at the International Peace Gardens. Through her affiliation with WBDI-Alberta Chapter, Kathie also serves as Co Organizer of "Girls in Jazz", a program created in Calgary in 2023 to encourage and support women of 'all ages and stages' in furthering their study in jazz, with the ultimate goal of creating gender parity on professional jazz stages of the future. Bands under Kathie's direction have been the recipients of several local, provincial and international awards and she has been the recipient of various personal awards: Alberta Band Association's "Elkhorn Award" as the Band Director of the Year; Alberta Band Association's "Vondis Miller Legacy Award"; Laureate in John Philip Sousa Legion of Honor at the MidWest Band and Orchestra Conference in Chicago. Women Band Directors International, "Scroll of Excellence"; David Peterkin Award from the Phi Beta Mu Band Masters Fraternity; and an Honorary Lifetime Membership from the Alberta Band Association. Kathie continues to be active as a free-lance musician (trumpet) and has performed with many groups including among others, the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, the Rocky Mountain Symphony Orchestra, Prime Time Big Band, Alberta Winds, and most-recently with the Calgary Jazz Orchestra and Altius Brass. Besides music, Kathie enjoys woodworking, horseback riding and is an avid baseball fan. Go Cardinals!

Brian Uzick



Brian Uzick grew up in Melville,
Saskatchewan where he learned to play bass
clarinet and clarinet in school band and
saxophone in the jazz band. He attended
University of Saskatchewan and received a
Bachelor of Music in Music Education. He
began teaching band and choir at in Moose
Jaw, Saskatchewan. During this time, he
attended the University of British Columbia
and received a diploma in Counselling
Psychology. He moved to Calgary, Alberta
where he taught at Western Canada High

School from 1991-2006 and was the Fine Arts Curriculum Leader. For 12 years, Brian taught grade 7-12 concert band, jazz band and was musical director for musical productions at Strathcona-Tweedsmuir School. He was the Fine Arts Curriculum Leader for 9 years. The Senior Band grew in numbers from 15 to 70 members and toured to California, Texas, Illinois, Austria, Russia and Italy. He also became certified to teach the Middle and Senior International Baccalaureate programs. He retired from Strathcona-Tweedsmuir School in June of 2018 but remains very busy. He continues to teach clinics, guest conduct, plan workshops, mentor and adjudicate throughout Western Canada.



Ross McIntyre



Ross McIntyre has been a conductor/educator within the Westwinds Music Society adult band organization in Calgary since 1992. He retired from The Calgary Board of Education in 2019 after thirty years of teaching both junior and senior high school music and is currently teaching for Mount Royal University, (Custom Music Workshops) as teacher mentor, guest conductor and trumpet clinician. Ross continues to be active throughout western Canada adjudicating music festivals.

In 1993, Ross received the "Excellence in Teaching Award" from the Alberta government and in 2001 received the "Tommy Banks Award" for his contribution to Jazz education. Ross was honoured in 2006 as one of the University of Calgary's "Top Forty Alumni". In 2013, Ross was awarded by the Canadian Government with the Prime Minister's Award for teaching excellence.

Along with friend and co-producer, Samantha Whelan Kotkas, Ross received funding from the Canadian Space Agency to create and produce "From Blue To Red" - a hard cover children's book and interactive online e-book. The

book was written and illustrated by Lord Beaverbrook High School students whom were inspired by several professional mentors from across Canada. "From Blue To Red" features the narration of Jazz legend, Diana Krall and three Canadian astronauts: Dr. Robert Thirsk, Julie Payette and David Saint- Jacques. The e-book continues to live online in both English and French at: www.frombluetored.net or www.dubleuaurouge.net. "From Blue to Red" was chosen as the recipient of the 2013 Award for "Best Children's and Young Adult Book of the Year" among Alberta Publishers.

Mark Hopkins



Dr. Mark Hopkins is a
Professor in the School of
Music at Acadia University in
Wolfville, Nova Scotia. In
addition to leading the Wind
Ensemble, Dr. Hopkins teaches
undergraduate and graduate
Conducting, Instrumental
Music Education courses,
SoundPainting, and chamber
music courses.

Dr. Hopkins is in demand as a guest conductor and music

education consultant. Since 2003 he has collaborated with Dr. Gillian MacKay as Artistic Co-Director of the Denis Wick Canadian Wind Orchestra, which selects players through annual national auditions, and is Artistic Director of the Nova Scotia Youth Wind Ensemble. In May 2019 Dr Hopkins received the National Band Award from the Canadian Band Association, recognizing his contributions "...to the promotion, growth, and development of the musical, educational, and cultural values of band throughout Canada". In November 2016 Dr. Hopkins received an Established Artist Award from Arts Nova Scotia for his leadership as a conductor of new music projects, especially in Shattering the Silence, an innovative new music festival (www.shatteringthesilence.ca) His work as a conductor has been recorded on LIVE WIRED (2015) and In Sonorous Falling Tones (2017, nominated for a 2018 East Coast Music Award). In Canada, he has guest-conducted bands and orchestras in British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia, Ontario, and Quebec, and led the National Youth Band of Canada in 2019. Abroad, he has led collegiate and professional performances in the United States, Bermuda, Hong Kong, China, Japan, Italy, Switzerland, and Romania.

A native of Toronto, Dr. Hopkins graduated from the University of Toronto (B.Mus. Ed.), the University of Western Ontario (B. Ed.), the University of Calgary (M.Mus. Conducting), and the New England Conservatory (D.M.A. Wind Conducting). While attending NEC he served as Assistant to Frank L. Battisti and was awarded the Gunther Schuller Medal at graduation. Prior to his appointment at Acadia University Dr. Hopkins led ensembles and taught at the University of Calgary and Hanover College in Indiana (1999-2005). Prior to these appointments Dr. Hopkins taught music in high schools for twelve years, including seven years of service as Chair of the Music Department at Upper Canada College in Toronto. His professional work as a Conductor spans the full range of ensembles and genres.

Sigurd Johnson



Dr. Sigurd Johnson is an Associate Professor of Music and Director of Orchestral Activities and Percussion Studies at North Dakota State University. From 2008 to 2021 Johnson was the Director of NDSU Gold Star Marching Band and was responsible for all the university athletic bands. Prior to his appointment at NDSU, he served as Director of Bands and Percussion at Valley City State University in Valley City, ND; Director of Bands and Instrumental Music at Rust College in Holly Springs, MS; and as a percussion arranger and instructor on the staff of the University of Memphis Marching Band.

While living in the mid-south, Dr. Johnson was a member of the percussion section of the Memphis Symphony Orchestra, an active jazz and theater freelance performer and a clinician/adjudicator. He also spent four years teaching and performing in

Norway. Currently, Dr. Johnson spends a portion of his summer teaching percussion at the International Music Camp, where he is also an executive member of the IMC board and Past President of the IMC US Corporation.

He has served as the East Region Band Representative for the North Dakota Music Education Association, is a past president of the North Dakota National Band Association; and has served as North Dakota State Chair for the collegiate chapters of the Music Educators National Conference (NAFME). Johnson has also served as Chapter President of the North Dakota Percussive Arts Society.

He is active in the upper Midwest as a percussion, jazz ensemble and marching/concert band clinician and adjudicator, as well as a guest conductor of Festival and Honor bands. Dr. Johnson is a Yamaha Percussion Instruments, Sabian Cymbals, Evans Drumheads and Vic Firth Sticks and Mallets artist as well as a member of the Black Swamp Percussion Instruments Education Team.
